

# Program Grants, 2019/20 and 2020/21

Between fiscal 2019 and 2021, the Catherine Donnelly Foundation granted over \$4.6 million to more than 80 organizations and surpassed \$20 million in total giving since our founding in 2005.

In addition to the one-time grants in our program areas of Adult Education, the Environment and Housing listed below, CDF offers multi-year grants to programs and projects that propel systems change. During our last two fiscal years, A Way Home Canada and Righting Relations each received \$250,000 annually, while Healing Through the Land received \$200,000 and Ecojustice received \$150,000 per year.

We also occasionally designate funds to recognize specific need. In 2021, for example, we created a \$225,000 grant pool for BIPOC-led and BIPOC-serving organizations.
